# HISTORY OF THE CLASS

We were then called Freshies and, unaware of loneliness, we kept up with the rest of the classes with the advice of our principal Rev. A. E. Bigelow. We were able to jump around and peep thru the cracks to the Sophomore's room. About the middle of the year, our class won her first honor, getting second place in the Inter-Class meet. We felt easy except once in a while when our bitter enemy Algebra, attacked us. Examinations came and some dropped by the wayside while others were conditioned.

June came again. With our hearts filled with mingled feelings of gladness and anxiety at the meeting of friends, we again heeded the call of the old bell. There were twenty-five boys and three girls. We were now required to study a little harder with the help of Mr. Dineros, Mr. Cordova, Miss Houger and Mr. Bigelow. Once in a while we had to go around and view the fields, learning the names of trees and stones here and there and praising some of our beautiful flowers. It was on one of these rambles that one of our members, Mr. Dofeliz, admired a rose and stopped to pluck it. So we left him behind. Altogether our life was not easy. But what hearts were there that were hindered and troubled but could be relieved and cleared by attending the Musical Vesper Services the last Sunday of every month? Thus refreshed, we turned again to face the fight with the help and guidance of our adviser Mr. Nequin and Miss Houger who helped us and comforted us during our troubled hours. As she left the Philippines for her furlough, we hoped for her happy vacation and safe return.

Behold the Juniors! How interesting this year was. We still had Mr. Bigelow and Mr. Stuart and also Mrs. Stuart who visited us every day and told us about many interesting things in Biology. We missed some of our teachers but had a new one in whom we found great help, Mr. Tomaneng. How busy and interested we were! We searched every nook and corner to look for things to use in our laboratory. How busy Mrs. Stuart too! But then came Mr. Fernandez from the States to help. As a supplement to our Biology work, we had our excursion to Sanao, an insignificant spot on the island of Guimaras. Happy and curious Juniors as we were, we did not mind inclement weather but we were very eager to see the ocean inhabitants and the forest of sharp corals, some of which we brought home for specimens. Another event of Junior year was the coming of Mr. and Mrs. Thornton who gladly sacrificed their time and strength to drill us in our play, "After Taps". Although we did not recite with Mrs. McNiece we could not help but feel her influence in the school. One of our members, Mr. Emilio Alegata was elected as the president of the Jaro Industrial School Republic in preference to the Senior candidate.

Three of our members went to the Baguio conference during the Christmas vacation. Then too, some of our members were asked to participate in the military competition against Guimbal Institute and San Augustin College in which our school won her fourth silver cup. Examinations came at last in which three of the class failed.

Senior year has come, our last year with our dear Alma Mater. Few as we are, undoubtedly these survivors will stand to the last. We found another new teacher, Mr. Aguilin, from the States. At the beginning of the year, scarcely a month passed but we had a social gathering or party. Fresh from the Junior room we were not conscious that we were going to face battles of deep thinking and sleepless nights.

We are now twenty boys and one girl. On the fourteenth of October we received the

news of the death of one of our former members, Miss Felicidad Montaña. We recall pleasant memories of her while she was with us. In our class rooms we have cheerfully answered the questions except those of our giant enemy, Physics, which needs cracking of the brain and sweating of the brow. But Mr. Stuart helps us in every way and so we get along all right. The first great problem that arose was the raising of funds for financing a souvenir, a problem which is not easy to solve but requires keen thought and hard work. So under the management of our class president, Mr. G. Demaisip, and our untiring business manager we have had several successful cine benefits and a musical program with the help of the J. I. S. Glee Club and Mrs. Stuart.

More eager about things along the wayside than before, (although the way is thorny) we have pressed onward with faith and hope for a bright end. With the Guiding Spirit in every ones heart we proclaim our inspiring motto, "I Will".

# CLASS PROPHECY

I was one day in Dungon sitting on a fallen coconut tree considering the problem as to how I might improve the line of educational work in the province of Romblon when suddenly the trees, the banana plants and the bamboo groves nearby were transformed into beautiful buildings and the small brook with its shallow water became a navigable river with big commercial ships anchored hard by its wharves.

My eyes were attracted by a big building with huge letters in front which read, "Penden Grocery Store". I immediately went in and there I saw three persons, each sitting near an office desk with several telephones on each. They were my friends Mr. Bibit, the president of the store, Mr. Temelo with his round belly and Mr. Yap with his long "Sanchoy," the managers. I did not interrupt them in their busy affairs. I went out quietly and made my way to the custom house to find out what boat was going from Iloilo to Romblon. Just as I arrived at the wharf near the custom house the S. S. Empress of Russia from the United States anchored. Her stair cases were lowered and the passengers began to descend from her deck. In the group which came down first was Mr. Tupas who had graduated from a school of philosophy in the United States. He greeted me with a philosophical expression which I did not understand. Hastening to bid him goodbye I went to a place where stones and steel bars were piled up not very far from where the boat stopped. There, a man with his palm shading his eyes was busy directing his men in constructing the bridge of Dungon. Mr. Gomez was the district engineer of Iloilo. His assistant was Mr. Alaestante, the only person who gained entrance to the society of Phi Beta Kappa in the Dungon College of Engineering. They stopped for a while to converse with me but in the midst of our conversation a canon shot was heard from the south. Engineer Gomez then told me that a regiment under Colonel Lauron with the help of Major de la Torre, was practicing shooting in preparation for the invincible Otto of Maasin and Papa Esio of Negros. Not convinced by the engineer's report I went to the barracks. There Colonel Lauron was explaining to his gunners the mechanism of a 50-inch gun. Major de la Torre was also instructing the soldiers how to make dugouts and trenches. I did not disturb them but I went to the place where all the bureaus were located. Chemists Benedicto and Gellecanao were there in their laboratories. Oh! my, they were very glad when they saw me. After staying with them two days I made for Zamboanga again. My two friends gave me two carloads of refined sugar. Were they not generous? Arriving in Zamboanga Sunday not very far from the capital, on a plain, I saw a crowd of Moros, perhaps five thousand in number. Two persons were talking in their midst. I went near the speakers and recognized them to be Rev. Leo Orendain and Rev. Pacifico Huelar. Both had graduated from a school of theology in the United States. I was also glad to meet Mr. Laguna in Misamis. He owned the greatest area of the province. Most of his wealth came from his coconuts. Mr. Laguna was the master of thirty servants so that he never did anything in his palace but sleep.

I went back to Manila to attend the Superintendent's Conference and stopped in

the Manila Hotel. I was very glad indeed to hear that Mr. Valencia had purchased the hotel. He provided me with first class meals and charged me nothing. The generosity of the hotel keeper made me sick because of the varieties of food I ate so I went to the General Hospital where my town and classmate, Miss Demandante, was the head nurse. She was in the operating room instructing the other nurses. She, too, offered me special treatment giving me a dose of castor oil once in a while. She whispered comforting words to me until at last my consciousness returned to me. I opened my eyes and found myself sitting on the same log. The weather was fine and around me were the goslings and chickens singing. Possibly it was they who awakened me from my uneasy nap.
