



green leaves of the trees, and the vines. Listen! how sweet the song of the birds.


Are these all the contributors to the happiness and anxiety of the twenty one to reach the top? Surely they are all very inspiring. As it is the last hill to be traversed, we therefore


married an ideal Filipino lady who once was studying in the Iloilo High School.




